National Pet Dental Health Month



"I love you, but you have dog breath!" It's fairly safe to assume most pet parents have uttered this phrase at some point in their relationship with their pet but foul smelling

breath could be an indication of poor dental health or a serious medical condition.

Just like us, pets can suffer from a wide variety of dental ailments that can lead to bad breath, broken or missing teeth, trouble eating or even abscesses or infection. In cases of extreme decay or infection, excessive bacteria can build and end up in the bloodstream, which can turn into a deadly blood infection.

Signs of poor dental health can be

- bad breath
- broken or loose teeth
- teeth that are discolored or covered in tartar
- abnormal chewing, drooling, or dropping food
- reduced appetite or refusal to eat
- pain
- bleeding from the gums
- swelling in the areas surrounding the mouth
- abscesses or infected teeth

Thankfully, most pets can be trained to accept having their teeth brushed. NEVER use human toothpaste on a pet. There are specially made flavored toothpastes for pets that are safe for animal use. Start by getting your pet used to you handling their mouths. Always be gentle with your pet while lifting their lips or moving around their tongues. This is also the perfect time to check your pet's gum color; gums should always be a medium shade of pink. Pale/white gum color can mean anemia; yellow can indicate jaundice and a blue/gray color can indicate lack of oxygen in the cells. After checking the gum color, inspect your pet's mouths for signs of injury or trauma. Pets love to play with their mouths, and a ball, rope or chew toy can accidently lead to a

Health Tip for the Season

Brushing your pet's teeth is not only good for fresh breath and tooth health. but it's important for your pet's overall health and wellness. Broken and infected teeth or abscesses can lead to bacteria entering the bloodstream and could cause a life-threatening blood infection. In addition, pets with broken or missing teeth may have trouble chewing and eating, leading to a higher risk of choking and malnutrition.

<u>Training Tip for the Season</u>

Be patient with your pet as you are getting them used to having their teeth brushed. Start slowly by giving them a taste of the pet safe toothpaste, then slowly lift their lip until you see the teeth and gum line. Gently brush in circular motions with a pet toothbrush, or rubber cleaning finger, or

mouth, gum or tooth injury.

Allow the pet to have a small taste of the toothpaste to introduce the flavor and consistency of toothpaste. Slowly introduce the toothbrush or rubber cleaning finger into your pet's mouth, making sure to watch for signs of agitation or stress. If your pet is in pain or uncomfortable, a pet parent can end up getting bit. Make slow, gentle circles across the pet's teeth and gum line, making sure to get the back molars as well. If your pet needs to take breaks, allow them a minute.

To help keep teeth clean and healthy between brushing, there are products that can be sprayed directly into your pet's mouth or added to their water bowls. Dental sticks and toys won't work to remove plaque and decay and often times can cause more harm than good with sharp, jagged points injuring the gums and soft tissue of the mouth. In cases of extreme decay or heavy tartar build-up, it may be best to seek out the help of your pet's medical professional.

Keeping your pet's mouth clean and healthy will benefit them for their entire lives and lowers the risk of pain, decay and infection. As an added bonus, pet parents won't have to worry about the pesky pet breath smell!

cotton swab. Check the gums for abnormal coloring or injury. Gums should be healthy shade of pink. Inspect the mouth for broken teeth, growths or injuries. If your pet is suffering from hardened tartar build-up, there are dental sprays that can be put directly on the teeth or added to a pet's water. Always remember to reward your pet when finished.

Heart Shaped Cranberry Cookies for Dogs

Ingredients

- 2 Eggs
- 1.5 Cups Almond Flour
- 1 Tablespoon Coconut Oil
- 3-4 Tablespoons Coconut Flour
- 1/2 Cup Dried Cranberries

Directions

Preheat oven to 325 degrees

Beat the eggs and set aside

Combine almond flour, coconut oil, and dried cranberries in a bowl.

Add in the eggs and knead the ingredients with your hands. Dough will be wet and sticky.

Add in the coconut flour one tablespoon at a time to achieve a consistency that is easy to roll out and not overly sticky. This should take approximately 3-4 TBSP.

Roll out the dough and cut out the treats using heart shaped cookie cutters.

Place the treats on a cookie sheet lined with parchment paper.

Bake for 15-18 minutes or until crisp.

Catnip Heart Cookies

Ingredients

- 1 cup of all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup of whole wheat flour
- 2 tablespoons of wheat germ
- 2-4 tablespoons of catnip
- 1/3 cup of milk
- 2 tablespoons of vegetable oil
- 1 tablespoon of molasses
- 1 egg

Directions

Begin by preheating the oven to 350 degrees.

Combine the dry ingredients in a bowl (flour, wheat germ and catnip).


Combine the wet ingredients in a bowl (egg, milk, vegetable oil and molasses).

Mix the wet and dry ingredients together and work it into a dough

Remove a portion of dough and use a rolling pin to flatten the dough to a thickness between 1/8 of an inch and 1/4 of an inch.

Cut the dough into hearts using a cookie cutter or a knife.





Place the cookies on a lightly greased cookie sheet.

Bake the cookies for 10 to 15 minutes, or until the cookies are crisp and lightly browned.
