# Pancreatitis: The Dangers of Thanksgiving foods



Thanksgiving is a time of family, festivities and food, but beware, there is a potential danger lurking in sharing that food with your pet – Pancreatitis! Pancreatitis can have very serious, potentially deadly, consequences for your

#### pet!

Pancreatitis is the inflammation of the pancreas caused by digestive enzymes becoming active while still in the pancreas instead of the small intestine. These digestive enzymes actually start to digest the pancreas itself, causing inflammation, tissue damage, swelling and severe pain!

One of the leading causes of acute pancreatitis is large amounts of fatty foods such as

- ham
- bacon
- gravy
- buttered mashed potatoes
- fatty trimmings
- turkey skin
- pastries, cakes and cookies

The most common symptoms of acute pancreatitis in pets is loss of appetite, vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal pain, swollen abdomen, hunching over, lethargy, restlessness and persistent gagging.

If you suspect your pet has pancreatitis, they need to be seen by a veterinarian immediately. If caught early, acute pancreatitis can be treated successfully with antibiotics, anti-nausea medications and small portions of bland food to allow the pancreas to rest and heal. However, if pancreatitis isn't treated, it could lead to internal bleeding and organ failure.

Our faithful friends have a way with those cute, soulful eyes, but don't give in! Our pet's digestive tracts are simply too sensitive to sudden diet changes to risk including them in the holiday meal.
